2. May Recap – Genevieve Kacmar, House of Color



Color Analysis

"Color has a profound impact on your mind, body, and mood. What you wear on the outside directly affects how you feel on the inside."

Genevieve, located in Boston, is a color and style consultant with the House of Colour. Genevieve spoke to us for an hour about finding the right color palette to show off your natural beauty.

She began with reminding us that "Everything you wear sends a message" and that everyone has their own "brand". To illustrate a brand, she asked us to compare Ellen DeGeneres to Kate Middleton. For Ellen, the image of blazer, slacks and flat shoes comes to mind. But for Kate, we see classic, tailored, fitted dresses with heels. They each have a brand and so do we.

For color, you want to identify the right colors/shades that match your underlying skin tones. The House of Colour uses four seasons of color on a color wheel: Winter, Autumn, Spring and Summer. Primary colors; true red, blue and yellow, form the basis of overall scheme. Winter and Summer have blue undertones and are cooler, clearer colors; while Autumn and Spring have yellow undertones and are warmer and muted colors. True red is a color that is in every season and is the only common color. Black, a very popular color, however, is only in Winter. GASP!!! Everyone has black in their wardrobe! Genevieve advises that if you're not a Winter, you can still

wear black, but try to keep it on the bottom half or when wearing it on top, use a scarf, jacket or other accessory in a color that comes from your palette.


Moving on Genevieve talked about makeup, accessories, and style. Genevieve shared that she is a huge fan of wearing lipstick! She showed a few photos of her with and without lipstick. Wow – what a difference a little color made. And then she *disrobed* (just a bit) and removed her blazer, chunky necklace, watch, bracelet, high heels and LIPSTICK and asked what we thought of the two images; all dressed up vs missing a few bits. It was clear that her dressed up version presented a polished image, one to be taken seriously (as Genevieve said). When dressing, Genevieve said to think about your accessories, jewelry including your glasses, hair color/style, and your makeup/lipstick as "points of interest". For the casual look, you might want to limit the "points of interest" to 8 or 9. For a more dressed up look, 10-13 "points of interest" can work. More than 13 "points of interest" in your look, will be distracting and is very difficult to successfully pull off.

Genevieve explained that House of Colour provides consultations on your color scheme, makeup and style. The company markets makeup for every season. She does individual and group color and/or style consultations in the Boston area.

Hopefully Genevieve sparked new interest in the colors and shades of fabric we select for our garments.

Rowena Burke shared three gorgeous makes: a raincoat sewn in a discontinued pattern from the Sewing Workshop, an Ora Pinafore by Soften Studio, and a shirt by the Assembly Line Patterns. The fabrics were from Lorraines, purchased several years ago. They look so pretty and oh so comfortable!





Donna Mansolillo shared a little boy's cotton shirt (Simplicity 9652) and little girl's circle skirt that she made for two special children. The circle skirt was inspired by a Threads article, issue 205, which instructed on the formula for making circle skirts.







Maureen Rozes made a fleece poncho for her grandaughter. It's adorable! Maureen said on FaceBook that the poncho is big enough to last her at least 2 years.





Cindy Bucco shared a beautiful black knit dress, where she lined the lower part of the sleeve with a pop of polka dot fabric. The dress pattern is from Burda and the fabric was from Apple Annie's. Cindy said the dress reminded her of Vanna White's dresses from Wheel of Fortune. Cindy just happened to be wearing a black and white polka dot blouse which sneaked into the photo but if you look closely, you can see the outline of the dress sleeve. What a lovely classic dress!



Karen Penn was inspired by a pattern she found at a yard sale. With cute sewing themed fabric, she made a sewing machine cover, a case for her scissors and little heart pouch for notions. That pretty set would brighten up any sewing room!



Rose O'Koren is moving through her alphabet challenge! Remember her "ABC Challenge" with Judy Kessinger. She is up to "E" in the Judy Kessinger "ABC Challenge". The top is "E" for Erica and has princess seams front and back with a gorgeous neckline embellishment. Rose also made the black palazzo pants to coordinate. Very pretty!

Denise Carlson shared a clever way to recycle your sewing scraps using the company Retold Recycling. The company supplies a pre-labelled and pre-paid bag which you fill with any textile scraps and pop it in the mailbox when filled. Retold then sorts and recycles the contents of the bag, making sure nothing goes to a landfill.


Naomi Lipsky showed us what you can do when you alter a ready to wear dress and use the extra fabric to create a cute bolero. Here's what Naomi wrote,
